Cedar Hedge Lake is an exceptional lake! If you get skunked here, you've got some problems. Try the areas in red for the largemouth and smallmouth bass. There are way more largies but there are a few dandy smallies too. The yellow areas are some of my favorite bluegill spots. You can do really well for bluegill and rock bass. I've caught very few bluegills that topped 10 inches but you can expect plenty in the 8-9 inch range.

Try for the northern pike in the blue areas. There aren't many and a lot of them run small. A buddy of mine pulled out a 38.5 incher ice fishing a few winters back. There are also a lot of may accidentally catch one. I met an older gentleman on the ice who was targeting ciscoes or lake herring. I saw one I floating that was good sized in the summer so that confirmed it for me. They would be in the deep hole off the launch. Also, the DNR did a survey a few years back and they netted a 27 inch walleye.

There used to be more but obviously there's still a few swimming around. There's definitely good habitat for all the fish with all the weeds and schools of minnows. This is a great lake to explore and take the kids!
